

## MLA Format 8<sup>th</sup> ed.: Journal Article

**Format:** Author’s Last name, First name. “Title of Article.” *Title of Journal*, vol. #, no. #, publication date, page number(s). *Database Name (if electronic)*.

**Example:** Smith, John. “Evaluating Muscle Symptoms.” *Journal of Neurology*, vol. 74, no. 2, Jan. 2016, pp. 58-71. *Health Reference Center Academic*.

**Note:** Skip information that you don’t have, but place a period at the end of each container.

Author’s Last name, First name. Example: Smith, John.	
“Title of Article.” Example: “Evaluating Muscle Symptoms.”	
<i>Title of Journal</i> , Example: <i>Journal of Neurology</i> ,	
vol. #, no. #, Example: vol. 74, no. 2,	
publication date, Example: Jan. 2016,	
page number(s). Example: pp. 58-71.	
<i>Database Name (if electronic)</i> . Example: <i>Health Reference Center Academic</i> .	

**Format:** Double-spaced, hanging indent, in alphabetical order.

**Capitalization:** In a title or subtitle, “capitalize the first word, the last word, and all principal words, including those that follow hyphens in compound terms.” (MLA p. 67)

**Page Numbers:** If citing a single page, use: **p.** before the page number. If citing a range of pages, use: **pp.** If given only the starting page of the article, use a plus sign: **pp. 93+**.

**Authors:** If two authors: **Smith, John, and Mary Fields**. If 3 or more: **Smith, John, et al.**
